Out-of-School Time Definition/Program Parameters Provided:	Survey of after-school program availability, type, and cost offered by public and private schools, local governments, and non-profit organizations (statewide)	SJM 5 defined “out of school” as encompassing before or after school programs, including programs related to tutoring, homework help, literacy support, youth leadership training, service-learning, twenty-first century learning centers, arts, health and wellness and other enrichment-oriented learning activities for school aged children
Access:	66% of providers offer some form of transportation (duplicate counts reach 73%)	Transportation not tracked in this study, though study notes that many providers provide transportation as part of child care/afterschool programming
Synopsis of Cost:	Before and after school programming is least expensive (\$132.19 monthly), with summer being most expensive (\$186.40 monthly) based on hours of programming provided and type of activity offered	Cost of program not identified in this study—though funding allocation by department to county, municipal, and tribal programs are provided

Gaps:	Full extent of school-age care providers not accounted for in survey response	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Dollars spent on out-of-school time programming can only be estimated in this study based on service population (includes adults along with children and youth) ▪ Funding is specified by county primarily ▪ Outcome measures not uniform across programs ▪ Title I not reported (DOE to school districts) ▪ Models not identified (prevention/intervention suggested in study as recommendation) ▪ Recommendation to define a positive youth development philosophical framework and programs to support
